

The Legendary Glowing Rock Father By Eric Brosius

The December meeting featured our annual Holiday Celebration with treats, micromounts, fellowship and the traditional silent auction, which was made famous by Ralph Thomas.

Ralph was a Rockhound's Rockhound. When it came to minerals Ralph would collect, conserve, promote, display, sell, talk, give-away and just about anything else you could do with the mineral collecting hobby. He coined the saying, "Buy Rocks Note Stocks". His love for minerals, especially micromounts and fluorescent minerals, instilled in him a desire to create a Micromineral Study Group, then a Micromount Swap-&-Sell and then in 1976 a Micromount Symposium through the now defunct Rock & Mineral Club of Lower Bucks County, PA, Inc. (RMCLBC). His backing of micromounting continues to live on in the Leidy Microscopical Society's Annual Micromount Symposium. Additionally, his love of fluorescent minerals urged him to create an all-fluorescent mineral show, through the RMCLBC, known as "ULTRAVIOLATION", which continues to survive under the Fluorescent Mineral Society.

One of Ralph's favorite events, during shows and celebrations, was the silent auction. In his honor the Society continues the tradition at our Holiday Celebrations and the Annual Micromount Symposium.

In remembrance of Ralph's joy of micromounting, our group's December meeting subject was Ralph Thomas micromounts. Ralph Thomas micromounts have been documented in Rocks & Minerals magazine, and recently on the internet website Mindat.org where he is referenced as the Legendary Ralph Thomas. Ralph Thomas mounts were circulated among the group for viewing. At the end of the meeting a vote was held for the best Ralph Thomas mount. Karenne Snow to the top spot with an Aragonite specimen. Dick Braun came in second as almost all the mounts he shared were of exceptional quality.

In the discussion around Ralph Thomas "isms":

- Christel Hoffmann recalled how she found out about the RMCLBC and Ralph through meeting Richard "Dick" Bostwick at the New England Mineral Conference. Dick Bostwick had called Ralph about a possible new member and before Christel even returned home Ralph had called her to visit a meeting of the RMCLBC.
- Dick Braun mentioned how Ralph would organize collecting trips, especially to Mont St. Hilaire. He also told how Ralph wanted members involved at shows with interactive



- displays. Ralph had Dick provide an overhead projector where he placed a chemical solution on a hot plate. As the solution evaporated mineral crystals remained. The audience could witness the actual creation of a mineral.
- Bill Prince remembered Ralph for his delegating ability. Ralph had the uncanny ability to get club members to do things, hold positions, renew memberships. Few members could refuse him.
- Your author recalled how Ralph had no problem contacting members day or night, including all hours of the night, about their dues, club tasks or other general mineral related questions.

Ralph, we honor you. Your love for minerals continues in all of us.

In other Society business, the annual micromount symposium advertisements have been sent out to all the hobby magazines and other clubs. Suggestions were made to include a list of available hotels, in the area of the annual micromount symposium, for out-of-town symposium attendees. Additionally, membership sign up forms will be made available at a membership table at the symposium.


